VOCABULARY

- Disbanded(v): (of a group) to stop existing, or to cause a group to stopexisting
 - The managers <u>planned</u> to disband the <u>team</u>.
- Setbacks (n): Something that <u>causes</u> <u>delay</u> or <u>stops</u> <u>progress</u>
 - Democrats <u>suffered</u> a <u>serious</u> setback in yesterday's <u>election</u>, <u>losing</u> all three contested <u>seats</u>.
- Peasants (n): a <u>member</u> of a <u>low social class</u> of <u>farm workers</u> and owners of <u>small farms</u>
 - Most of the <u>produce</u> <u>sold</u> in the <u>market</u> is <u>grown</u> by peasant <u>farmers</u>.
- Livelihood: the way you <u>earn</u> the <u>money</u> you need to <u>pay</u> for <u>food</u>, a <u>place</u> to <u>live</u>, <u>clothing</u>, etc.:
 - They <u>earn</u> <u>their</u> livelihood from <u>farming</u>.
