Latinx students account for 13% of total enrollment in NCCCS institutions, and they experience disproportionate success compared to white students. Researchers from UNC Charlotte and community partner, LatinxED, will present research findings and best practices for supporting Latinx students in the transfer process. The discussion will draw on findings from interviews in a larger study of NC pre-and post-transfer students exploring engagement and identity, as well as survey results on relationships between student engagement, intentions, and outcomes in community college. Improving Practice in the Great 58: Leveraging the Carnegie Project on the Education Doctorate to Expand Educational Opportunities and Student Success in North Carolina Community Colleges

The mission of the Carnegie Project on the Education Doctorate (CPED) is to transform “the advanced preparation of educational professionals to lead through scholarly practice for the improvement of individuals and communities” (CPED, 2021, 3). Employing values embracing diversity, learning through continuous improvement and growth, partnerships that help in the design of projects to solve authentic problems of practice, the lived experiences of educational professionals, social justice, and students first, it is CPED’s vision to build “a future where equity-minded educational professionals lead lasting and positive change” (CPED, 2021, 2). East Carolina University (ECU) utilizes its CPED-influenced dissertation in practice to graduate “service leaders who lead, serve, and transform complex and changing educational environments” (ECU, 2022, 1). Utilizing inquiry methods that encourage partnership-engaged foci to improve teaching, learning, and student success, ECU has graduated 18 community college leaders since becoming a CPED consortium member in 2014. The purpose of this session is to reflect upon the improvements in community college teaching, leading, and student success within the Great 58 through ECU’s CPED-inspired dissertation in practice and to engage in further conversations on community college and regional public research institution partnerships to expand educational opportunities and further improve practice.
